Forced displacement following attack on Egbekaw village (Mamfe Central Subdivision/Manyu Division/Southwest Region)

13 November 2023

Update on needs-assessment

On 10 November, the Protection Cluster led the joint multi-cluster needs assessment exercise in Egbekaw and Lala Quarter neighborhood. The Protection Cluster team was led by its co-lead CARITAS and protection cluster partner Intersos.

A contextualized Multi-Cluster/Sector Initial Rapid Assessment (MIRA) tool as well as the P21 Protection Household Questionnaire were administered (using Kobo toolbox and paper forms) by mixed teams during Focus Group discussions, and Key Informant interviews at the Egbekaw community hall and at the Lala Quarter Head's residence.

A total number of 230 affected persons (183 female and 47 male) were assessed. The 5 mixed teams that conducted the assessment each included Protection, Shelter, and Nutrition partners.

Due to security concerns, household interviews were not conducted door-to-door. They were instead conducted at the assessment sites (Egbekaw community hall and Lala Quarter Head residence), using the P21 Protection Household Questionnaire.

UNHCR/Intersos plan to conduct profiling for Protection Cash assistance on 14 November. The UNHCR Cash-for-Cash-for-Protection beneficiary selection tools will be used for this profiling.

The preliminary results of the needs assessment and profiling exercises will be available on 14 November and further details including full list of participant organizations will be shared.

Update on protection response capacity:

- UNFPA's partner LUKMEF has 200 dignity kits pre-positioned in Buea.
- UNICEF is coordinating with Caritas Kumba and the Ministry of Social Affairs (MINAS) in the Southwest and Northwest regions to distribute around 120 dignity kits pre-positioned in Buea, and 350 prepositioned in Bamenda.
- UNHCR will provide Cash-for-Protection through its partner Intersos. The Cash-for-Protection timeframe is around 2/3 weeks and requires community profiling, data analysis and verification, then payment. Intersos will conduct the profiling for Cash-for-Protection on 14 November.
- Intersos and AMEF will carry out MHPSS activities (individual and group) on the ground.
- IRC will also be providing MHPSS to survivors of the attack. IRC will deploy an MHPSS Officer to Mamfe on 14 November while they wait for the joint MSNA Report for a possible joint response with other partners.










Situation overview:

On Monday 06 November around 03:30 AM, suspected NSAG members attacked members of the "Boki" community

living in Egbekaw village. Over 15 houses were burnt during the atttack, leaving around 20 people injured and at least 50 deaths. While some of the severly injured have been admited to the nearby public health facility *Urban Integrated Health Centre Mamfe* for intensive care, others are being transferred to health facilities in Kumba (170km south of Mamfe) and to the Regional Hospital in Buea. Intersos has started supporting the Regional Hospital in Buea with Psychological First Aid (PFA) for 8 patients and their relatives. For reminder, the Mamfe district hospital was completely destroyed by fire during armed clashes between State Security Forces and suspected NSAGs in June 2022. As a result of this, casualties are either treated at the Urban Integrated Health Centre in Mamfe or reffered to Kumba and Buea health facilities.

The "Boki" community is one that spreads across the Cameroonian border with Nigeria. This community is said to have fled Akwaya (another neighoring town along the Cameroon-Nigeria border, North of Egbekaw) some years ago due to the armed conflict, to settle in Egbekaw. Currently, some reports suggest that supected NSAGS allegedly blamed "Boki" community members of having informed State Security Forces which led to the killing of one of their commanders. Other accounts claim that members of the "Boki" community had recently hired mercenaries from Nigeria to defend them against NSAGs threats in Egbekaw, which resulted in the killing



of a separatist fighter on Sunday 05 November. The NSAGs therefore retaliated by attacking the "Boki" community the next day.

The aftermath of this attack is a serious concern for local communities, authorities and humanitarians. While more than 380 people have been displaced so far, distressed inhabitants of Egbekaw are still on the move as a result of this armed attack. According to some reports, "Boki' community members living in other neighboring villages (Small Mamfe, Teachers Quartre neighboord) have received threats from NSAGs and are also fleeing their homes. Various Church communities have been hosting some of the displaced persons.









Highlights

*Update:

- On 10 November, the multi-sectoral needs assessment team arrived in Mamfe and met with partners and community members at the Egbekaw village hall. On the same day, the Senior Divisional Officer (SDO) of Manyu visited affected persons and households on the incident site (around 200m from the Egbekaw village hall).
- On 09 November, Mamfe town was reportedly quiet and in mourning. Businesses and schools were closed in solidarity to victims of the Egbekaw attack. The Christian community organized prayers in Egbekaw, followed by a football match.
- More than 380 people have reportedly been displaced since the attack, most of whom are women and children. Church communities (Caritas Mamfe) have been visiting affected households in Egbekaw and reported many female -headed and some children-headed households already.
- Heavy military presence (State Security Forces) has been observed in Egbekaw, and some are allegedly conducting raids. Some civilians were released free of charge while others had to pay an undisclosed fee.
- The population is traumatized and frightened and is fleeing to neighboring villages including Small Mamfe (Mile 1 and Lala neighborhoods), Besongabang (Banya neighborhoods). Some of these villages are however also being fled after receiving threats of further attacks from suspected Non-State Armed Groups (NSAGs).
- Many of the victims whose houses were burnt down find themselves on the streets. Some are hosted by Church communities including the Diocese of Mamfe and Presbyterian church.
- Host community members who are non "Boki" were also affected by this attack.
