<p>Presentation on the Legislation App developed by colleagues from Equip Mozambique</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Equip Mozambique introduces the application called “Juris”, focused on legislation. The App is being developed in partnership with AMAC - Association of Christian Lawyers. Equip Mozambique is responsible for the technical part of the App, while AMAC works on interpreting the legislation to make it easy for readers to understand it. • There are currently three laws available, Family Law, Land Law, and Traffic Law. The App will be launched with these three legislations commented by AMAC, but other laws will be continually added. • Equip Mozambique is seeking partnerships in two areas: financial partners and legal content development. • UNHCR asks if there are more applications released. • Five apps have been released. One is called Aidai, which was released after Idai with health information (e.g. how to get to hospitals), shelter, and over 4000 downloads were done in the first month only. The App generates useful reports showing how and where the App was accessed, what content was accessed, etc. • UNFPA asks if there is GBV information available in the applications. 	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Equip Mozambique will share the presentation and UNHCR will disseminate to members of the Protection Cluster (PC).

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Equip Mozambique reports that in “Juris”, in the Family Law section, there is information on GBV prevention. • UNFPA suggests that “Juris” also be presented to SC GBV. 	
<p>Protection Gaps shared by the CCCM Cluster on 21 September</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The main protection challenges shared on September 21 are similar to those shared three weeks ago. Please find some of them below: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> I. Savane - Inactive WFS and Ação Social is not present on the site; II. Bandua 1 – increase in the number of thefts - the security committee is disabled due to lack of payment; III. Begaja - WFS inactive, Ação Social is not present on the site and there are concerns about the presence of mines; IV. Inhajou - there are no protection activists on site; V. Estaquinha - no activists and CFS; VI. Mahdjamedge - there are no Protection actors on site. • UNHCR asks if PC members have identified how to assist in filling in some of the gaps indicated. • PC members do not speak up, and UNHCR narrates the content of the message sent earlier this week on the protection gaps to encourage participation. • UNFPA reports that it is currently placing the WFS in Savane. • UNHCR asks if there is any news about WFSs in Begaja. • UNFPA will be in Buzi next week and Begaja may be one of the next resettlement neighborhoods to have WFSs in place. 	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. PC members committed to consider ways to fill in the gaps identified and highlighted during the meeting.
<p>Schedule of coordination meetings at district level to be held in October</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Following the first series of coordination meetings held at district level in September 2019, the PC discusses a timetable for a second series of meetings in October 2019, given the large number of recommendations to be followed-up. • UN Agencies should have movement restrictions due to the October 15 national elections. Thus, UNHCR will confirm that field visits from 7 to 25 October can be conducted. • In any case, it is suggested that the coordination meeting be held next week in Dondo because of the strong need for strengthening coordination mechanisms in that district. • If travel restriction is confirmed, coordination meetings at district level would resume after October 25. 	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. DPGCAS will confirm whether the district coordination meeting can be held next Tuesday or Wednesday in Dondo.

<p>Updates from the GBV and Child Protection Sub-Clusters and from the Disability Working Group (DWG)</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • UNHCR asks if there are any questions about documents shared recently with PC members – updated mapping on Services and Police Presence and 5W • PC members do not have questions • UNHCR asks if PC members have been receiving the e-mails and if their content have been relevant to the activities of different members. • SCI informs that is receiving emails and the content is relevant • UNHCR reports that all documents shared with the PC are also available on the Humanitarian Response website. • SCCP (UNICEF) is working on retrieving data collected at the beginning of Idai's response on the situation of children in Sofala to guide future projects • After the elections there will be a case management seminar with partners and government officials for harmonization. It will possibly be in Beira, but the location is not yet defined. • SCCP also informs that it will soon be able to share a mapping of CP (5W) activities to PC members. • SC GBV (UNFPA) informs that WFS is being implemented in Savane. • SC GBV has also been working to train DPGCAS members and local NGOs in data collection and monitoring. • There will also be post-distribution monitoring of dignity kits in Dondo, Nhamatnda and Buzi. • The next SC GBV meeting will be on Monday, September 30. • DWG (HelpAge) continues with psychosocial support, health, and especially documentation, for elderly people. The second phase of its response to Idai will begin on October 1st. • FAMOD has been conducting district visits with LFTW to restructure its presence. 	
<p>Updates from the members of the Protection Cluster</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • UNHCR reports that it remains in Beira co-leading the Protection Cluster until December 31. • UNHCR is finalizing the protection monitoring dashboards for Cura, Savane and Mandruzi. These documents will be shared shortly. • UNHCR finalized the distribution carried out from April to September 2019 of nearly 90,000 CRIs, benefiting over 6,000 families in Sofala. • ASATE conducted a training that began last Tuesday, with the participation of an American consultant, on the preparation of chicken feed. 	

	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • DPGCAS will celebrate the international day of the elderly on October 1, with the theme “Don't let the elderly out, they are our roots” in Nhangau. DPGCAS invites everyone to participate in the celebration. • SCI began today the distribution of toys for the CFS in Mutua. • Plan International trained 45 members of the Community Committee on Child Protection in Buzi, in partnership with DPGCAS. 	
Any other business - AOB	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • DPGCAS asks partners to support the purchase of a laptop to complete the minutes on the PC meeting. They reported difficulties in drafting the minutes during working hours on the DPGCAS computer. Thus, a laptop would be required to do so after working hours. • DPGCAS will send the per diem document today as it could not be sent last week as agreed.
